

DR. JONGWOO HAN

President

Dr. Han is the President of the Korean War Legacy Foundation and World History Digital Education Foundation. His major research and publication areas include networked information technology and its impact on social capital, elections, politics, and democracy as well as the relations between North Korea and the United States. He also constructed the Korean War Veterans Digital Memorial (KWVDM, www.kwvdm.org) and led the incorporation of the Korean War Legacy Foundation. He is an associate member of Korean War Veterans Association and the Korean War Veterans Central New York Chapter #105. He has published several books including, Networked Information Technologies, Elections, and Politics: Korea and the United States (The Lexington Books, 2011), Understanding North Korea (The Lexington Books, 2014), and Power, Place, and State-Society Relations in Korea: Neo-Confucian and Geomantic Reconstruction of the Developmental State and Democratization (The Lexington Books, 2014). His involvement in the academic exchange program with the Kim Chaek University of Technology (KUT), DPRK, since 2002, has produced many noticeable academic achievements including KUT's first digital library in 2005. Dr. Han served as the host of New York Radio Korea from 2008 - 2009 and regularly returns as a guest on this weekly talk radio program about U.S. politics and Korea. Dr. Han earned a Ph.D. in political science from Syracuse University in 1997.



JOSEPH KARB

Executive Director

Joe Karb has taught middle school Social Studies in Springville, N.Y. for 23 years. He was selected as the National Council for the Social Studies Outstanding Middle School teacher in 2012. Serving as both a C-SPAN Fellow and C-SPAN Senior Fellow, Joe developed a number of civic education initiatives at the cable network. Working extensively with national social studies standards, Joe served as an inquiry writer on the New York State C3 Toolkit. He also served on the Board of Directors of the National Council for the Social Studies for six years. Since 2016, Joe has served as the Executive Director of the Korean War Legacy Foundation, leading the development of the KWLF website, curriculum books, teacher workshops, and the veterans' archive. His work has been featured nationally through several different media outlets.

Greg is a Social Studies teacher and leader in the Webster Central School District (NY). He has taught a variety of courses at Webster Thomas High School and is also a district level Instructional Leader in Social Studies and in Professional Learning. He is the 2013 NYS Teacher of the Year and works with Elementary, Middle School, and High School teachers inside and outside the district. As an AP World History teacher, he also served as Co-Chair of the AP World History Development Committee and led the development of AP Insight for World History. He speaks to groups and districts across New York State on teaching, leadership, and the potential of all students to learn with a specific focus on developing a growth mindset.

Allison is a National Board Certified Teacher and an Advanced Placement Human Geography teacher at duPont Manual High School. Outside the classroom, her current AP Human Geography experience includes the moderating of the AP Human Geography Community, serving on the College Board AP Human Geography Instructional Design Team, acting as an Organizing Committee Member for the Geography Teacher Fellows program with the American Geographical Society, participating in the Kentucky Advisory Committee for National Geographic, and taking on various leadership roles at the AP Reading. Gabe earned a B.A. in Historical Studies from the University of Texas at Dallas in 1996 and an M.S. in Modern European History from the University of North Texas in 2006. He is currently the Social Studies Department Chair and Instructional Coach, College Board® Academy Assembly Delegate, and head Academic Decathlon coach for Frisco Heritage High School and serves as the lead GT Humanities Teachers for Frisco Independent School District. Gabe held the position of Coordinator of Gifted and Talented for Plano Independent School District from 2007-2009. Gabe currently teaches GT Humanities, a two-year English I and AP® World History course at Heritage High School in Frisco, Texas. Mr. Bae, Sung Won is currently the Director of the Korea Foundation USA. Prior to this post, Mr. Bae served as Deputy Director of Global Network Department, Senior Officer of the Global Network Department and the Chief Assistant to the President of the Korea Foundation. Mr. Bae was also the Director of the Korea Foundation's Los Angeles Office and Jakarta Office.

MAPAE GRANT

The WHDE is honored to have a cadre of dedicated educators sharing resources produced by the foundation to teachers throughout the world. To recognize the outstanding work of these teachers, the Mapae Grant was created.



The Mapae medal is based on the medallion used by officials of the central government during the Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910). The King's hand-picked special officials who ranked "Number One" in the nation's civil service exam during Joseon Dynasty, called "Eosa" (literally meaning the official dispatched by the King), traveled through regional areas on public duties and primarily prosecuted corrupt officials in the provinces. Eosa with Mapae were allowed to have special access to saddle horses kept at government-run post stations upon presenting their Mapae medal.

Similar to the Joseon officials, teachers who, first, were trained at a KWLF function and have been awarded the medal will be provided resources based on the number of horses on their medal. The goal of the Mapae Grant is to help educators share the knowledge about Korean history, South Korea's simultaneous rapid economic development and democratization, and the Korean War with their colleagues. Foundation staff are available to assist teachers in developing their grants which may include workshops, classroom projects, or school events. All completed Mapae Grants are published on the Foundation's website.
